Overview + Materials

As the crisp autumn air settles in and the trees put on their colorful display, there's nothing better than cozying up with a handmade beanie. The Falling Leaves Beanie

Crochet Pattern is inspired by the beauty of autumn, featuring textured stitches that mimic falling leaves. Whether you're heading out for a walk among the leaves or just need a stylish and warm accessory, this beanie is the perfect fall project.

Skill Level: intermediate
Yarn: Worsted Weight (#4)
Hook: 5.0 mm
Construction: ribbing brim + body +
crown shaping + pom pom

MATERIALS

150g Worsted weight (4) yarn (I used Yarn Bee Soft & Sleek)

H/5.0 mm hook

yarn needle

scissors

YARN SUBSTITUTIONS

This pattern works best with a worsted weight (#4) yarn.

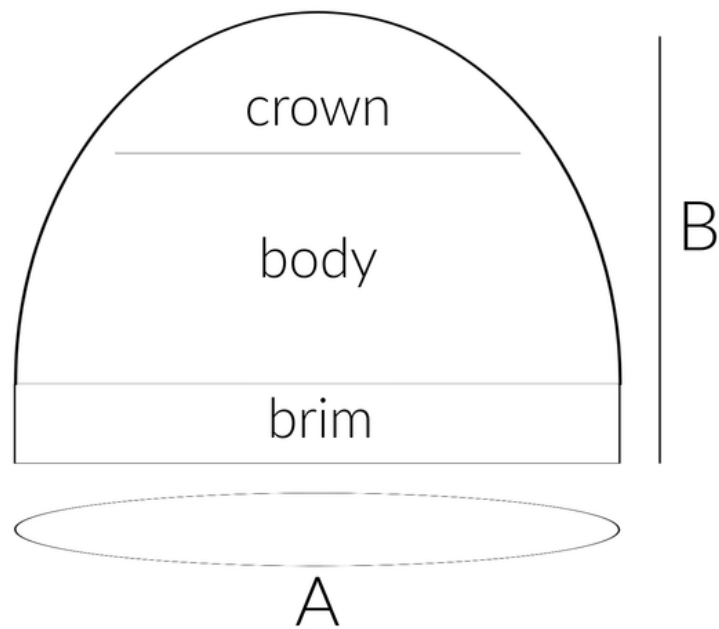
Sizing + Gauge

Size	A Circumference (in)	B Length (in)
Child	17	8
Sm Adult	20	9
Lg Adult	22	10

NOTES ABOUT SIZING

- To customize the sizing, change the number of rows in the ribbed brim. The number of rows must be a multiple of 4.
- Sizes: Pattern is written in 3 sizes, Child, Small Adult and Large Adult consecutively. Example, when the pattern gives the end of the row count as (68, 76, 84) , the 68 is the child the 76 is the small and the 84 is the large.

Schematic



LABEL PLACEMENT

- A (Circumference) → horizontal across bottom of the brim
- B (Length) → top of crown → bottom of brim

Notes + Abbreviations

PATTERN NOTES

- written in US terms
- ch 1 does not count as sc
- ch 2 does not count as dc
- Beanie is made from the bottom up, starting with single crochet ribbing (tutorial included), then the main portion is made with the falling leaves stitch (tutorial included), last decreases are made around the crown.

STITCH ABBREVIATIONS

blo - back loop only

ch – chain

dc - double crochet

fp - front post

rep - repeat

sc - single crochet

sl st – slip stitch

st(s) - stitch(es)

t - turn

* * - work step in between asterisk

Special Stitches:

CL – *yarn over, insert hook in stitch, pull up a loop* x2, yarn over, pull through 4 loops, yarn over, pull through 2

lfpCL – long front post cluster (front post cluster in the row below the previous row)

dc2tog – double crochet 2 together

Pattern Instructions

RIBBED BRIM

HOW TO CROCHET SINGLE CROCHET RIBBING

Ch 11

Row 1: sc in 2nd ch from the hook and across (10 sc)

Row 2: ch 2, t, sc in first st, sc blo in 8 sts, sc in last (10 sc)

Row 3 – Row (68, 76, 84): rep row 2

Bring both short ends of the ribbing together, slip stitch the ends together. Now you will work around the top rough edge of the ribbing in joined, turned rounds.

BODY

HOW TO CROCHET THE FALLING LEAVES STITCH VIDEO TUTORIAL

Round 1: ch 1, sc evenly around, working 1 sc in the end of each row of ribbing, join to the first sc with sl st ((68, 76, 84) sc)

Round 2: ch 1, t, sc in each st around, join to first sc with sl st ((68, 76, 84) sc)

Round 3: ch 2, t, dc in 2 sts, *lfpCL in next, dc in next 3,* rep from * to * around to last 2 sts, lfpCL in next, dc in last, join to first dc with sl st ((68, 76, 84) sts)

Round 4: ch 1, t, sc in each st around, join to first sc with sl st ((68, 76, 84) sc)

Round 5: lfpCL in first st, *dc in 3 sts, lfpCL* rep from * to * around to last 3 sts, dc in last 3, join to first dc with sl st ((68, 76, 84) sts)

Round 6: ch 1, t, sc in each st around, join to first sc with sl st ((68, 76, 84) sc)

Round 7 – Row (10, 14, 18): rep rounds 3 – 6

CROWN

Decreasing for the crown begins in the next rounds

Round (11, 15, 19): ch 2, t, dc2tog, *lfpCL, dc in next, dc2tog* rep from * to * around to last 2, lfpCL in next, dc in last ((51, 57, 63) sts)

Round (12, 16, 20): ch 1, t, sc in each st, join to first sc with sl st ((51, 57, 63) sc)

Round (13, 17, 21): ch 2, t, lfpCL (around dc2tog), *dc2tog, lfpCL* rep from * to * around to last 2 sts, dc2tog, join to first dc with sl st ((34, 38, 42) sts)

Round (14, 18, 22): ch 1, t, sc in each st, join to first sc with sl st ((34, 38, 42) sc)

Round (15, 19, 23): ch 2, t, *dc, lfpCL* rep from * to * around, join to first dc with sl st ((34, 38, 42) sts)

Round (16, 20, 24): ch 1, t, sc in each st, join to first sc with sl st ((34, 38, 42) sc)

Round (17, 21, 25): ch 2, t, lfpCL/dc2tog (one side of the 2tog is lfpCL and the other is dc) around, join to first dc with sl st ((17, 19, 21) sts)

Round (18, 22, 26): ch 1, t, sc in each st, join to first sc with sl st ((17, 19, 21) sc)

Round (19, 23, 27): ch 2, t, fpdc2tog around to last, fpdc in last, join to first dc with sl st ((9, 10, 11) sts)

Round (20, 24, 28): ch 1, t, sc in each st, join to first sc with sl st ((9, 10, 11) sc)

Fasten off. Leave a long end for sewing.

Weave the long end in and out around the top of the beanie. Pull to cinch it closed. Sew the top closed.

Finishing + Care

BLOCKING

Lightly dampen your project, shape it to size, and allow it to dry completely before use. Blocking helps give your finished project a polished look by evening out stitches and improving the overall shape, drape, and keeps the edges from curling.

WASHING

To keep your crochet project looking its best, wash gently using cool water and mild detergent. Hand washing is recommended for most handmade items to help preserve the stitches and shape.

DRYING

After washing, gently remove excess water and lay the project flat to dry, out of direct sunlight or heat. Avoid wringing or hanging items, as this may stretch the fabric out of shape.

GENERAL CARE

Proper care will help your handmade project last for years to come. Store your item folded when possible and keep it away from rough surfaces that may snag the stitches. Over time, your project may benefit from light re-blocking after washing to help restore its shape.
